Lakeland Library Cooperative

42 member libraries belong to the Cooperative, which includes 78 library buildings providing access throughout the eight county area of Allegan, Barry, Ionia, Kent, Montcalm, Muskegon, Newaygo and Ottawa counties.

40 of the LLC member libraries participate in a shared online catalog that gives patrons access to materials owned by libraries throughout the Cooperative. This shared system provides a public catalog of materials owned by all participating libraries, as well as a system for circulation. The online catalog allows libraries to share books and audio-books through the Lakeland delivery system.

Most of the LLC shared catalog member libraries, along with Kent District Library and Grand Rapids Public Library, participate in the MeLCat statewide inter-library loan system. This provides West Michigan patrons with access to a large collection of books and other materials owned by libraries throughout the state, including academic and special libraries.

Through various subscription plans among the member libraries, patrons have access to e-audiobooks, e-books, eperiodicals and, for some libraries, e-music and e-movies.

All Lakeland libraries participate in reciprocal borrowing that allows patrons to travel to other Lakeland libraries to check out all types of materials.

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Cooperatives encourage communication among libraries of all sizes and help them deliver quality services to their communities.

Cooperatives increase the level of service Michigan's local libraries provide their communities.

Cooperatives work with their member libraries, other Cooperatives, library associations, the Library of Michigan, the State of Michigan, e-government and other organizations to develop and coordinate high quality services for the benefit of Michigan's residents in the most cost-effective manner.
